On November 18, 2005, at 2:08 p.m., you left me a telephone message while I was not in the office. You contended you recently discovered on the Internet that a female you allege to be "Tove Jensen" was depicted in two of the seven videotapes you were convicted of possessing in a case against you which I prosecuted in 199[REDACTED] and that she was over 18 years old when those two tapes were made. You said this information was available at "worldhistory.com" and at "wikipedia" [sic]. You stated you also provided this information to AUSA [REDACTED] and to U.S. Attorney [REDACTED]. Finally, you said that you and your family would appreciate my informing the [REDACTED] of your discovery, and you left a telephone number of [REDACTED]

As you may not realize, not everything one finds on the Internet is reliable or accurate; on the other hand, some things found on the Internet are reliable and accurate. Your voicemail message to me provided no information by which the information you now assert to be so would be admissible in evidence nor any information of its foundation, authentication or reliability. Nonetheless, I have forwarded your assertions (in a copy of this letter) to the [REDACTED] [REDACTED] for such further investigation as may be appropriate.

You have also now attempted to bring your "findings" to the attention of the [REDACTED] [REDACTED] in two recent supplemental filings to your pending application to file a [REDACTED]

Separately, I have filed a "Response. . ." to those supplemental filings and, with this letter, I enclose for you a service copy of that response. As you will probably refuse to see, your legal position is untenable and factually, you were and remain properly convicted.
